Safety concerns from both sides of the bike-car relationship

PASSING



As close as practicable: While the Highway Traffic Act does not specify how close cyclists should ride near the right edge of the roadway or the clearance drivers must give a cyclist when travelling alongside or passing them, drivers should pass a cyclist only when it is safe to do so. Bike Winnipeg suggests providing at least one metre of clearance. This may require drivers to change lanes in order to pass safely.

DISTRACTED DRIVING



Texting for five seconds while driving 90 km/hr means you've driven the length of a football field...BLINDFOLDED!

Intersections are high-risk locations for cyclists and motorists. Using hand signals, eye contact, and obeying all traffic laws can help minimize the risk of collision.

PREDICTABILITY



Cyclists often ride 1.5 m away from parked cars to avoid being in the 'door zone.' Motorists can practice the 'dutch reach' when opening their doors to ensure approaching cyclists are in sight.

Being visible is about what you wear and how you ride. Whether you're riding at night or during the day, wear bright, reflective clothing and always stay in the motorists' field of vision.
